I must admit that I was quite surprised to hear from you this morning, and I'm very pleased to see that you intend to enter Dal next year (if, of course, you pass your school cert.).

As for myself, I like the University very much, and I'm sure that its scholastic standards are as high as you'll find anywhere in Canada.

I don't know which course you're intending to follow, but Dal is particularly noted for its law and medicine. If you are planning to take law, you have ~~have~~ two

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University. You can also receive this information from the Registrar, and I'm sure you'll find it very helpful. If you do decide to take these Grade XII exams, it entails a great deal of hard work, so I would advise you not to waste your time in the summer. You'll find the work there very helpful when you get to university. I made the big mistake of wasting my time there, and I found it quite hard to settle down again.

I don't want to sound like a father giving advice to his son, but I happened to have that particular experience and I wouldn't like it to happen to one of my friends.

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Alternatives: one is to take a pre-honours course which consists of two years Arts. The other is a full honours course, which consists of three years. This means you will have to take six subjects a year for three years. You may obtain three "credits" from first year law which will entitle you to a B.A. degree. However, the Registrar will be <sup>glad</sup> to explain all this to you.

I'll try to give you a little advice so you won't make the same mistake that I did. You will be allowed to enter Dal. with your School Cert., but you won't be given any credits. However, you can take Grade XII examinations at the University in September. If you do this, you'll probably be able to get credit for first year.

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To Dal - I'm not - it's just that  
I don't want you to have the  
difficulties that I had to over-  
come. I highly recommend the  
place to you, but, like most  
universities, I think you'll find  
that it has its good points  
and its faults. In the long run  
I think you'll find that its  
fine points are more than  
enough to compensate for its  
faults.

You mentioned something  
about Athletics at the University.  
I'm afraid you'll find that you  
won't be able to devote too much  
time to them for fear of neglecting  
your studies. You'll also find

various functions at the University, belongs to a fraternity, and still have enough left over to buy a round trip ticket from Montreal to Bermuda. So you see \$1,000 per year is more than enough to get by on. I hope you'll find this pretty clear.

Now for a little more advice. For God's sake don't get any false ideas about University. Don't, as I did, expect too much of a University, for you'll find that you won't receive an education overnight. That only comes with age and study, as I have discovered during the last year. Don't think that I'm trying to discourage you from coming
